Equine Osteopathy - Not Just another Manual Therapy

Osteopathy is a novel approach to the diagnosis and treatment of musculoskeletal issues in horses. Visceral issues affecting the autonomic nervous system are often the root cause of loss of normal mobility in joints and thus lameness or performance problems in horses. This one day course will give practical knowledge to diagnose and treat visceral issues common in most domestic horses affecting their health, mobility and athletic potential. Veterinarians practicing chiropractic and/or acupuncture will gain knowledge that can further enhance results of their treatments. The knowledge and skills are pertinent to all equine veterinarians to improve the mobility, athleticism and overall wellbeing of their patients.

Osteopathy for Dogs and Cats

Osteopathy is a novel approach to the diagnosis and treatment of many musculoskeletal and neurologic issues in dogs and cats. This 3 day course will cover the basics of osteopathy as a manual therapy beyond chiropractic. Emphasis will be on the universal spay/neuter surgical adhesion as a major underlying factor of common mobility issues in dogs such as lameness, soft tissue problems in the shoulder, iliopsoas injury, cruciate ligament injury, back pain and IVDD. Veterinarians practicing chiropractic and/or acupuncture will gain knowledge that can further enhance results in many of their cases. The knowledge and skills are pertinent to all veterinarians to fully resolve many musculoskeletal issues, optimize mobility in asymptomatic animals, enhance athleticism and potentially prevent CCL injuries in dogs.
